Village Hall

Village Hall Meeting. The Village Hall Committee held a meeting on Wednesday, 13th February. We are grateful to Mr Nigel Haynes for renewing the Pre-school licence for a further ten years, and for completing the Charity Commission Annual Return.

Replacement for the Motor Car Treasure Hunt. At the Committee meeting, held on the 14th of November 2018, it had been agreed that the motor car treasure hunt had reached its "sell-by" date, and because the income from an event was needed to keep the village hall fund at a level necessary to meet routine and any unforeseen expenditure, it was necessary to find a replacement for the hunt. Several ideas were put forward, but it was felt that a decision should be delayed until future consideration by the full Committee was possible. In the meantime, we would like to have ideas for a suitable summer event from residents in the area. Please, if you have an opinion on this subject, let one of the Committee know so we can make a decision at the next meeting, if not before.

Extraordinary Meeting. On account of the smaller than usual attendance at the meeting and the decisions to be made, it was decided to hold an **extraordinary meeting of the Committee at 7.00pm in the village hall on Wednesday, 3rd April, when we hope to have a full Committee attending.**

Last year's quiz was a great success; we had seven teams participating and the questions were set by Mr Roger Collin. were able quickly to get a roofing company to carry out the work, and we now have a fibre-glass covering over a slightly sloping roof, and a guarantee for 25 years. 
With spring upon us the start of a new season fast approaches.

CHURCH NEWS - MARCH

A place I call home

Moving to a new house is known to be one of the most stressful things we can do. Having moved recently from Market Harborough into The Vicarage, Tilton on the Hill, has given me recent experience of this. Packing and transporting possessions with the risk of damage to them was quite stressful in itself but what surprised me was what it took to make the Vicarage - the house - feel like home, a place where we wanted to live. This prompted me to reflect on the importance of and what constitutes feeling 'at home'. Words such as welcome, warmth, shelter, food, belonging, love, peace and security came to mind.

A popular Bible reading often chosen for funerals quotes Jesus talking to his disciples about his Father's house:

'Do not let your hearts be troubled. Believe in God, believe also in me. In my Father's house there are many dwelling-places. If it were not so, would I have told you that I go to prepare a place for you? And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and will take you to myself, so that where I am, there you may be also.' (John 14. 1-3)

Jesus is speaking to his disciples, those closest to him, prior to his arrest, sentencing and crucifixion. The house he is talking about is not, therefore, a bricks and mortar building but a spiritual home residing with God. For those that have followed the stories of Jesus' life and his relationship with his followers, though the Gospel accounts, it will be clear that this is a 'house' that they and we would want to live in too. This passage is a source of comfort and hope to all as we contemplate the end of our earthly lives. I have read this passage many times but, on this occasion, I was struck by the phrase 'I will go and *prepare* a place for you' as if a special effort will be made in order to create that feeling of 'home'.

Some of you will have heard me talking about the 'special effort' a good number of people have made to make the vicarage feel like home, I am grateful to them all. Not forgetting the hamper that was left as a welcome when myself and my family arrived, full of treats and essentials, there was something for everyone, our sincere thanks to everyone who contributed to this. I also noted, however, the truth in a comment made by one of my family members: 'the fact that we have had to do things ourselves, like painting the walls, has made it feel more like our home.' The actions of others are very important in making us feel at home, but we also have to make a special effort. This is so true of Church and our journey of faith too.

To return to the words of Jesus, his is not just a promise for the future. Jesus promises to return to be with his disciples in their earthly life through his Holy Spirit: 'Those who love me will keep my word, and my Father will love them, and we will come to them and make our home with them.' (John 14.23). And Jesus gave his followers a new commandment: 'that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another.'

The vicarage is both a house and a home. It is both the physical building and the relationships of the inhabitants within and with those in the community around it which constitute the feeling of home. 'The church' is the term used for both the building and God's people (and that's everyone). A Church of England parish church is a place for the whole community, where all should feel at home. But creating a home for all needs working at by the many and diverse members of its community. How we go about this should be under constant review and takes time, prayer, patience and conversations. I have already heard and seen some of the ways members of the community are living well together or are keen to contribute in some way. My prayer is that I can find the time and opportunity to discover where to take these conversations and encourage us all to ask God, daily, to live in us and show us the way to build a community where all feel at home.
